

***Democratic Theory* Ethics Statement**

PUBLICATION PROCESS

Democratic Theory (DT) is a double-blind peer-reviewed journal. Articles are read by both editors and sent for review to at least two scholars with relevant experience and expertise. Referees are asked to advise the editors whether the article should be published and if so, with what recommended changes. The editors respond to the author with their decision and a list of any changes needed for the article to be accepted for publication. They may also send the anonymous referees' comments directly to the author.

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All submitted articles must be original works and not concurrently under consideration by any other publication. An author must not borrow substantially from their own previously published works nor submit manuscripts describing essentially the same research and conclusions in more than one journal or primary publication.

Proper acknowledgment of the work of others must always be given. Authors should cite publications that have been influential in their own work. If authors have drawn on the work of others and/or directly quoted the words of others, such works and direct quotes must be appropriately acknowledged and cited according to *Democratic Theory's* style.

An article must contain sufficient detail and references to permit others to locate published sources. Fraudulent or knowingly inaccurate statements constitute unethical behaviour and are unacceptable.

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The corresponding author is the author responsible for communicating with the journal for publication. The corresponding author should ensure that all appropriate co-authors and no inappropriate co-authors are included on the article. All co-authors should have seen and approved the final version of the article and have agreed to its submission for publication.

Acknowledgment of Funding Sources

Sources of funding for the research reported in the article should be duly acknowledged at the end of the article. All authors should disclose in their manuscript any financial or other substantive conflict of interest that might be construed to influence the results or interpretation of their manuscript.

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Peer review assists the editors and the editorial board in making editorial decisions, while the comments which arise from peer review should also assist the author in improving the article.

Any reviewer who feels unqualified to review the assigned manuscript or unable to provide a prompt review must notify the editors and excuse themselves from the review process.

Manuscripts received for review must be treated as confidential documents. They must not be shown to, or discussed with, others except as authorized by the editors.

Reviews should be conducted objectively. There shall be no personal criticism of the author. Reviewers should express their views clearly with supporting arguments.

Reviewers are expected to return constructive, supportive, polite, and ethically justifiable feedback. The editors expect reviewers to first redescribe the author's work to demonstrate their understanding of it, then to highlight the article's merits, and only then discuss the article's shortcomings, lacunae, and/or errors. The latter should be done with the article's, and author's, development in mind.

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Reviewers will be asked to sign a short declaration indicating their acceptance of and adherence to *Democratic Theory's* policies concerning peer review.

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
